
Workshop objectives

- 6. Options for a breeding program
- 7. Increase the value of local breeds

- Each chapter of the draft guidelines was evaluated
- Introduction to chapter, followed by (group) discussion
- Presentations of national programs and experiences by participants
- A field trip to see in vivo conservation activities in operation on several local farms.


