Norwegian Coastal Goat


- 2015: 280 females

- Gone feral since some time during the 1970's



The Kvist-goats's grazing area










Why culling them?

- The Norwegian Food Safety Authority has placed the flock under restrictions
 - Poor animal welfare for the feral flock
 - The owner cannot look after the flock as farm animals
 - The animal husbandry must be discontinued culled








Why oppose the decision to cull the herd?

- Face book group:
 - The animal welfare is great!
 - These are the happiest animals on earth!
 - It's a cultural heritage and we need grazing animals.
 - The Food Safety Authority is totally wrong.
- The AnGR conservation programme:
 - No genetics conserved from "old Norwegian landrace goat"
 - The genetic material in this herd is of great interest
 - We need time and resources to conserve genetic material from the feral flock.
 - HOW can we conserve some of the animals?
 - Been in dialogue with the Food Safety Authority for 15 yrs...
 - The animal welfare is not good.

The Norwegian Parliament in April 2025:

The Norwegian Parliament **urges** the government to take the initiative so that the Norwegian Food Safety Authority, instead of discontinuing the entire feral goat population... continues working to find solutions that safeguard the welfare of the Kvist goats and preserve their genetic resources for future livestock production.

Status 2025

- Norwegian Food Safety Authority has placed the tamed flock under restrictions – at least for four years.
- The kid-host will keep the herd as long as it takes.
- The relevant authorities, the kid-host and the owner of the feral flock cooperate very well.

The way forward

- Main goal:
 - Secure genetic material for the future
 - Discontinue the feral flock
- Actions:
 - Try to tame some of the feral animals Dec-Jan 2025/2026
 - Start culling (by hunting) the feral flock during fall 2025
 - Rescue more newborn kids in Feb-26
- Agreements in prosess:
 - 1. Food Safety Authority must accept the action plan
 - 2. Agreement on "conservation herd" for the tamed herd
 - 3. Agreement between host and owner of the flock
